**THIS** is Johnny Haynes' night but he will excuse a word or two about the club which has been his second home for twenty seasons.

Few will deny that Johnny was the biggest single factor in our rise to first division status in 1960.

His inevitable decline from his own tremendous peak has coincided with that of the club's fortunes—yet obviously it is not merely coincidence.

Perhaps too late we faced the fact of living without him and now we face the task of picking ourselves up from the third division.

There was hope we would survive and it has been decided that the set up which gave that promise after making the difficult and necessary transformation should be given the chance to see it through.

So Bill Dodgin has been confirmed as team manager and Billy Gray as his coach. May they repeat the success they achieved working together in similar circumstances at Millwall.

Graham Hortop has been elevated to secretary/general manager to remove the burdens of administration from the men who have the direct contact with the players.

They will continue to strive throughout the summer while others relax. There is much to do.

Meanwhile this is a night to forget our troubles and think only of Johnny the Greatest, the Magician, the Miracle Worker to quote just a few of the names given to him.

Our front cover shows what was probably his finest hour when he lead England to their 9-3 victory over Scotland at Wembley which clinched the international championship of 1961.

Johnny's great international career did not continue for him to be able to help in the World Cup triumph.

We like to think the chief cause of that was the leg injuries he suffered in his car crash, but we are convinced that without Johnny Haynes there would have been no World Cup success.

He became captain of his country when English football was at its lowest ebb following the 3-6 and 1-7 defeats by Hungary.

It was the Haynes-led team which gave England back its self-respect and more. This was the foundation on which others were fortunate to be able to build.

He can be proud of that and we are proud of him. Here is a man respected and envied by his fellow professionals, clubmates and opponents both.

## 1949 “TOSH” CHAMBERLAIN

**‘I was Johnny’s first contact at Craven Cottage. In fact I took him there in the days when nobody knew a 4-2-4 formation from a bit of 4 x 2 planking.**

We just used to go out and enjoy the game and try our best to win.

I played for England schoolboys the year before Johnny scored his first two goals against Scotland boys at Wembley. Even then he was a different class to most of us and I still say he was the greatest.

After all the 17½ years I played with him at Fulham he could still make me gasp with the way he used the ball.

He’s a great lad off the field too but as everyone knows he is a bit moody at times.

Once I swore at him on the field and the referee came across to take my name. I said “You can’t do that ref., I was only swearing at one of our own side.” He believed me too and put his book away.

I’m glad Johnny stayed on at Fulham. With a bigger club, one who could go out and buy a team, he would obviously have got some club honours to go with his international caps.

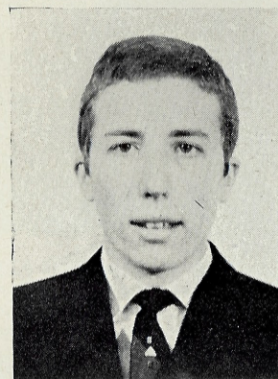
*Come to think of it though we did get up from the second division and we got pretty close to two Wembley finals as it was.*

**THE** newest Fulham signing to play with Johnny Haynes. He is 19, 6ft. 1in., 11½ stone and a striker whose experience has been mostly with Cray Wanderers in the Metropolitan League. He says:

‘It never occurred to me that one day I’d be playing with Johnny Haynes.

I often watched him on television, then I signed amateur forms for Fulham and suddenly there was my name alongside his for the reserves match with Bournemouth.

We drew 2-2 and we could have won. He made the chance for me to score our second goal and I should have had another from a pass of his.

He was so easy to play with. You knew before long you would always get the ball you wanted every time. He never gave a bad ball in the whole game.

What got me was the way a defender would go up to him and jockey him in just the way he should do yet Johnny would still go through with what he intended.

I enjoyed the match and I’m hoping there will be a lot more. But whatever happens I will never forget it.

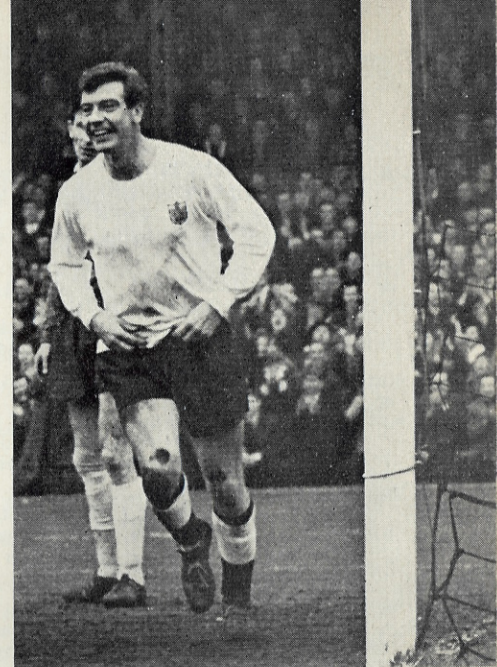
**L**IKE thousands of others, I grew up with Johnny Haynes as my hero.

### JOHNNY HAYNES' XI

- ★ **PETER BONETTI**  
Chelsea and England. Known to everybody in the game as the cat because of his amazing agility and reflexes.
- ★ **RONNIE HARRIS**  
Chelsea and England under 23's. Incomparable as a marker and tackler but has his constructive moments too.
- ★ **EDDIE McCREADIE**  
Chelsea and Scotland. A regular for his country for four years. Specialist at over-lapping attacks down the wing.
- ★ **JOHN HOLLINS**  
Chelsea and England. Current captain of England under 23's. Uses his burst of speed with clever effect both in attack and defence.
- ★ **JOHN DEMPSEY**  
Chelsea and Republic of Ireland. Returns to Craven Cottage which he left for a big fee earlier this year.
- ★ **FRED CALLAGHAN**  
Joined Fulham when a boy and earned his first team place by hard work. Can be a danger when he moves into the attack.
- ★ **CHARLIE COOK**  
Chelsea and Scotland attacker who is capable of wizardry which forces comparison with Stanley Matthews and Tom Finney.
- ★ **RODNEY MARSH**  
Queen's Park Rangers and England under 23's. Good to see him back at Craven Cottage where he first made a name. Went to Rangers and scored many of the goals which carried them from the third to the first division in two years.
- ★ **BARRY BRIDGES**  
Queen's Park Rangers and England. Was a schoolboy sprint champion and retains his speed which he has used to score many spectacular goals for Chelsea, Birmingham and now Rangers.
- ★ **JOHNNY HAYNES**  
Insisted on appearing in both matches tonight. Still loves his football after twenty seasons. The picture was taken the day he scored a hat-trick in a 5-0 defeat of Russia.
- ★ **CLIFF JONES**  
Fulham and Wales. Won most of his near record number of caps while with Spurs where he was showered with club honours.

### BOBBY MOORE'S XI

- ★ **PAT JENNINGS**  
Spurs and Northern Ireland. Makes goalkeeping look easy. Has hands bigger even than those of the late Frank Swift.
- ★ **BILLY BONDS**  
West Ham and England under 23's. Officially a back but is often mistaken for a winger because of his sweeping George Cohen type attacks down the wing.
- ★ **BOB CURTIS**  
Charlton—Immediately showed two seasons ago why his club were prepared to allow Bonds to move to West Ham. Tremendous potential.
- ★ **ALAN CAMPBELL**  
Charlton's secret weapon in their near-promotion run this season with his superbly timed and controlled runs into attack.
- ★ **BOBBY MOORE**  
West Ham and England's rock of a captain. Won the greatest honour open to a player when he led his country to the World Cup success.
- ★ **ALAN MULLERY**  
Spurs and England. Was moulded at Craven Cottage and since leaving has certainly justified his big transfer fee.
- ★ **DEREK POSSEE**  
Millwall's whippet of a winger who moved from Spurs to find a first team place and a chance to demonstrate his abilities.
- ★ **JIMMY GREAVES**  
Broke the scoring records at Chelsea and Spurs. Also cracked England's goals record. Incomparable in the 'box'.
- ★ **KEITH WELLER**  
Millwall's fast moving striker who also found his feet at The Den after moving from Spurs.
- ★ **GEOFF HURST**  
West Ham's spectacular scorer. The only man in World Cup history to collect a hat-trick in a final.
- ★ **MARTIN PETERS**  
West Hammer who can play in any position with success and has been known to do so in the same match. Has great match-winning flair and the bigger the occasion the better he performs.

There were near things—like the two F.A. Cup semi-finals and the time Fulham were promoted yet missed second division championship medals.

Yet playing with Fulham was not without its rewards. There are forms of appreciation which are not tangible yet are real enough. He knows this.

Then there was the time he won the Jackpot at Epsom Races... but that's another story. May there be many other such happy times when his playing days are done.

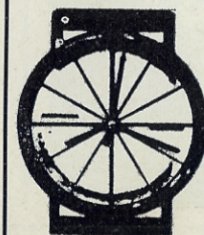
